#### Absence

- We pride ourselves in our excellent attendance rates!
- Any absence requires a note or telephone call explaining why. If we do not hear from you, your child's absence will be marked as unauthorised.

#### EYFS

- The Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) is the statutory framework published in 2012 by the Department for Education that sets the standards for the development, learning and care of children from birth to five.
- The EYFS is based on ongoing observation and assessment in the three prime and four specific areas of learning, and the three characteristics of effective learning.

# The <u>prime</u> areas of learning:

- communication and language
- physical development
- personal, social and emotional development

The <u>specific</u> areas of learning:

- literacy
- mathematics
- understanding the world
- expressive arts and design

Characteristics of effective learning:

- playing and exploring
- active learning
- creating and thinking critically

#### Learning Journeys

We use 2BuildaProfile to record observations and document your child's progress in learning. The main purpose of the EYFS profile is to provide a reliable, valid and accurate assessment of your child's learning over the year to the end of the EYFS.



The profile consists of observations such as:

- Samples of pupils' work
- Photographs

### How can you help? Communication & language

- Read them stories regularly
- Sing songs and nursery rhymes
- Take time to listen to them talking about things they have done
- Ask them 'how' and 'why' questions
- Let them ask you questions





### How can you help? Physical development



- Give children time to run, jump, climb and play outdoors
- Encourage building, drawing, threading beads, cutting, sticking, puzzles, filling and emptying containers (baking)
- Develop their independence with dressing, undressing and toileting
- Talk about ways to keep healthy and safe

### How can you help? Personal, social and emotional

- Encourage them to try new activities
- Help them recognise and express their feelings
- Talk about unacceptable behaviour and the consequences
- Play games which encourage sharing and turn taking
- Develop their independence







### How can you help? Literacy

- Read and share books daily (stories, information books, signs, newspapers, magazines, comics) and **ask lots of questions**.
- Phonics = word sounds. Use pure sounds only.
- Model correct letter formation and pencil grip
- Encourage them to read back their writing/ mark making

#### How can you help? Mathematics

- Sing counting songs and rhymes
- Help them count from 1–20 (socks, cars, shopping, cutlery, fingers and toes!)
- Use mathematical language (one more, one less, add, subtract)
- Talk about shapes, size, capacity, position, distance, time and money



### How can you help? Understanding of the world



- Talk about past and present events, and similarities and differences
- Let them join in with everyday activities (washing up, cooking, shopping, gardening, etc.)
- Talk about changes in animals and plants
- Give them access to technology (ipads, mobile phones, computers)

#### How can you help? Expressive arts and design

- Encourage singing, making music, and dancing
- Allow drawing, painting, printing and experimenting with colour, design and texture
- Praise and join in with imaginative play and story telling

- Helps you understand how your child is learning and developing during their first 5 years, in relation to EYFS.
- Children develop more rapidly during the first 5 years of their lives than at any other time!
