A letter has been sent home this week containing information about our upcoming sponsored event, along with a sponsorship form.

The children have voted and they would like to raise funds to buy the school a purpose built climbing wall at Nanpean School.

To do this, they will be taking part in a 12 day sponsored walk, run or jog in an attempt to clock up 3620 kilometers, the equivalent distance from Nanpean to Lapland!

<u> ATTENDANCE</u>

Attendance at Nanpean School has been lower throughout the first half of the Autumn Term, in comparison to previous years. It's always disappointing to see the school with a lower attendance rate. This is why we feel it is appropriate to write to parents to remind you that holidays in term time are still unacceptable, and can lead to penalty charge notices (fines) being applied by Cornwall Council. If your child is absent from school without authorisation, you will be committing an offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £60 if paid within 21 days or £120 if paid after this but within 28 days. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice may result in legal action. Absence not authorised by the school may result in prosecution in the Magistrates' Court under Section 444(1) or Section 444(1A) of the Education Act 1996, leading to a fine of up to £2,500 and/or a custodial sentence. Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to court.

YEAR 5/6 - STAYSAFE WORKSHOP

Richard from Stay Safe joined us for the afternoon on Thursday (17th November) and the morning on Friday (18th November). The workshop included understanding what bullying is and the types of bullying: verbal, online, physical and indirect. We discussed why bullying might happen and the children carried out some challenges set by Richard.

One of the activities including treating a person (a paper person) badly. Afterwards, the act of saying sorry and trying to make up for the poor treatment did not completely erase the pain caused to the paper (the crinkles and tears could still be seen). This was a very practical way to make an important point.

We shared some video scenarios with Year 5 and talked through the advantages and disadvantages to the approaches that were played out. An important message the children took away was to SPEAK OUT AND TELL SOMEONE.
