HEAD TEACHER WEEKLY UPDATE

After much rain and then extremely cold weather, it was finally nice for the children to be outside this week and not getting wet or freezing cold. Playtimes and fresh air are important for children and the difference in their concentration is noticeable when they are unable to have time outside.

As always, it has been a busy but enjoyable week, with Monday bringing some time in Year 5 (Drinnick Class) for myself, which I immensely enjoyed during their Maths lesson, and an enjoyable afternoon at Brannel, where we experienced sporting success by playing extremely well in the football tournament and winning this (getting the most points, scoring the most goals and conceding the least goals).

On Tuesday, I attended a Cluster Heads meeting at Brannel School. This was a very positive meeting that discussed sporting events that Brannel School and myself are planning for the schools in the Cluster, as well as a Poetry Festival being planned by Laura Hocking for the Summer Term. More information will be shared in the future, with children invited to attend events being organised for various year groups. After school, we had a football match at Treverbyn School. Then, when I arrived at school, I worked with other Leaders in School in relation to English, Maths and SEND monitoring across the school. This was positive in identifying strengths of provision, as well as some more tweaks for further improvements. At the time of writing (Thursday evening), I have just planned my next French lessons. However, these will be delivered next Friday (3rd February) due to myself having to attend a meeting on Friday afternoon this

Dear Parent / Carer,

As you may be aware from the News, one of the main Education unions, The National Education Union (NEU) have voted to take industrial action on the following dates:

Wednesday 1st February 2023

Thursday 2nd March 2023

Wednesday 15th March 2023

Thursday 16th March 2023

The advice being given to schools is for parents to put a plan in place for childcare for these dates, should your child's class be affected.

As Headteacher and Chair of Governors, we must respect the right of staff to take industrial action following a properly conducted ballot. Government guidance requires us to take reasonable steps to keep the school open, but decisions will be made taking into account health and safety and other factors. Staff can be asked, but do not have to inform us, of their intention to strike or not. Therefore, it is likely that you may only be informed on the morning of the above dates of any school / class closures, and some element of disruption is highly likely in schools.

We will provide further details as soon as we are able to do so, but please begin to consider alternative childcare arrangements for the dates listed above should this be required.
