Our topic for the next half term is 'Fabulous Fairy Tales.' The first story we will be exploring is Jack and the Beanstalk. The following challenges have been designed to be as practical as possible using resources you may already have in your home. Please upload a picture or video to Tapestry as you complete each task.

Explain to your child that you're going to pretend to escape the giant's castle, just like Jack. Encourage your child to listen carefully and follow the instructions. For example, can they tiptoe across the floor then gently open the door?	Collect some real leaves of different sizes from your garden. Encourage your child to cut up the leaves into different shapes to develop their scissor skills.	Look at pages from different parts of the story. Ask your child to identify how Jack might be feeling in those parts of the story. Why do they think that?	Read Jack and the Beanstalk. https://www.twinkl.co.uk/resource/t-t-12317-jack-and-the-beanstalk-ebook Compare it to other versions that you can find online. How are they the same? How are they different?
Make some puppets for the characters from the story. Use the puppets to act out the story with your family.	Encourage your child to try new movements by acting like characters from the story, such as stomping like the giant, climbing like Jack and throwing the beans like the mum.	Work together as a family team to build a free-standing beanstalk. How tall can you make it? What can you use to join the pieces? How can you use teamwork to get the beanstalk built? If available, plant some beans and observe what happens when they grow. They can be placed in a Ziploc bag with water and cotton wool and taped to a window.	Use junk materials to make your own castle.	Practise writing some of the Action Words in your book. Look for some of these words in a story book.
Take 10 of your magic beans (see creative) Throw them on the ground and count how many brown beans and how many golden beans you can see. Record as an addition sentence. E.g $3+7=10$ Repeat.	Use the internet to find out about castles in Cornwall.	Make a nature picture using leaves, sticks and petals. Maybe you could make a beanstalk picture.	Provide strips of paper and encourage your child to write a list of the things Jack might buy with the money from the golden eggs.
Take a handful of magic beans. Estimate (make a sensible guess) how many beans you have. Check if you were correct by counting.	Use the internet to look at pictures of different flags. Make your own flag or design one on Purple Mash.	Use saucepans and a wooden spoon to explore loud and quiet, fast and slow. Relate to the story of Jack and the Beanstalk. Can you tap the saucepan quietly so it sounds like Jack tiptoeing? Can you tap the saucepan quickly like Jack running away?	Put some flour in a baking tray and use this to write some letters, words and numbers. 

<p>Get two teddies. Share 6 magic beans between them. It is easier if you say “one for you and one for you” as you do it. How many beans did the teddies have each? Repeat for different numbers of beans. Can 5 beans be shared equally?
