Unfortunately, due to current guidelines, and following discussions with other local schools to ensure we are all doing the same thing, we are unable to invite parents to this event. However, children can attend in PE Kit on this day, and will, of course, be kept in their class bubbles.

THE POWER OF READING QUOTES FROM CHILDREN

All classes are currently trialling a new English scheme, titled 'The Power of Reading', ready for this being fully embedded into our Curriculum from September 2021. We will continue to teach Reading as we currently do, following the Read, Write, Inc scheme for Phonics, using Accelerated Reader in Year 2 and Key Stage 2, and using the VIPERS approach during lessons in school. The Power of Reading scheme will further compliment these reading activities, and is being used to teach other English skills, such as writing which includes Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling. This book based approach ensures children are immersed in high quality reading books and that they learn skills related to reading and writing. I personally taught a Power of Reading lesson for the first time last Thursday, when covering Year 3, and really enjoyed it, while I was amazed at the creativity in their ideas and quality of the children's writing. We have only just started trialling this but I also have some initial quotes from children:

Rianon - I love the way we get to read and explore interesting books.

Alfie - The Power of Reading is great, we read fascinating books which help

me to understanding reading in different ways.

Leah - It is much more interesting than just English!

<u>Parent Behaviour on School Site</u>

Unfortunately this week, I have had a couple of reports of parents using inappropriate language in their verbal conversations on the school site. If I hear this, I will ask parents to leave the site. Even though the language isn't being used offensively, it shouldn't be heard on a school site as myself (and other parents) do not want children to hear such language. Please ensure you are not using inappropriate language on the school site.

<u>CURRICULUM END PRODUCTS (JULY)</u>

This half term, we are trialling our revamped Curriculum ready for full implementation from September. We had intended to trial and implement this sooner, but Covid-19 expectations in terms of 'recovery' and 'catch up' have impacted on this.

In each subject, we now have a progression of skills, detailing what children need to learn in each year group. We also have KIRFS (Key Instant Recall Facts and Skills) that relate to the Progression of Skills. These KIRFS are facts and skills that we expect the children to learn and remember. Each term, classes will work towards an 'End Product', which collaboratively draws many of the skills and facts they have been learning together. For this trial half term, End Products will be completed and shared with children and parents in July (due to guidelines this will be via Class Dojo and Tapestry). This half term, the End Products in each class are:

Eden (Year R): an information book about sharks.

Hendra (Year 1): a wild rumpus performance.

Prosper (Year 2): a 3d sculpture depicting Nanpean in the past.

Karslake (Year 3): a class book.

Melbur (Year 4): an Art Gallery.

Drinnick (Year 5): a corridor of time.

Rosemellyn (Year 6): designing and creating a mural.

We hope you enjoy seeing these when they are shared at the end of term!
