### Year 2 National Curriculum Statements – Comprehension

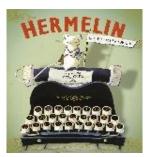

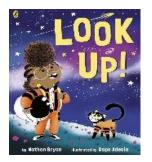

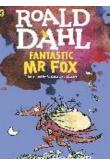
VOCABULARY		
Infer	Pick up ideas from the text that are not always written in the text itself.	
Predict	Make a reasonable guess about what could happen next.	
Explain	Make an answer clear by giving reasons.	
Retrieve	Find key pieces of information within the text.	
Sequence	Put things in order that they happened.	
Fiction	A story made up by an author	
Non-fiction	A text with facts and information.	
Traditional tale	A short story containing magic.	
Fairy tale	A short story containing magic.	
Vocabulary specific to each text will be identified by teachers.		



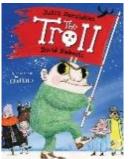








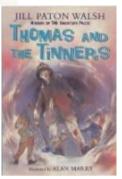




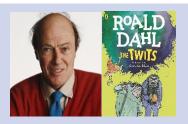
