



We will be creating a performance piece to include our poetry work from English, illustrations from art and a dance piece to be viewed during End Product week!



The children will be able to talk about their personal identity and key elements of Cornish culture. They will be able to remember key dates and facts about the China Clay industry.



Our class books for this term will be finishing the novel explored in Year 4 called 'Varjak Paw by SF Said' and 'FARThER by Grahame Baker-Smith'

Maths: We will cover Number units to include place value, addition and subtraction.

Vocabulary: add, subtract, place value, zero, less than, greater than

History: We will learn about local history and how it connects to our Cornish identity.



- Alfred Leslie Rowse was born in 1903
- He was born in Tregonissey on the edge of Clay County
- He was most well-known outside of Cornwall as a historian at Oxford.
- His poems were more likely to celebrate the beauty and peace of St Austell Bay.
- Rowse died in 1997

Vocabulary: history, past, era,

Geography: We will learn about local landscape and use maps to identify both local and world landmarks.



- Locate the countries of Europe, North and South America. – skill
- The Isles of Scilly, the Isle of Wight, the Shetland Isles, the Orkney Isles and the Isle of Man are all located off the coast of the UK.
- Greece, Hungary, Ireland, Italy, Latvia, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, Netherlands, Poland, Portugal, Romania, Slovakia, Slovenia, Spain and Sweden are countries in the EU.

Vocabulary: landmark, environment, landscape, map,

Art: Drawing on illustrations by Jesse Hodgson ("Dark Sky Park – Poems from the Edge of Nature") we will explore how to work with a limited colour palette when representing natural phenomena.



- Andy Warhol was an American artist born in the 1900's
- Andy Warhol was a leading figure in the visual art movement.
- Andy Warhol is well known for his pop art.
- Andy Warhol's first job was illustrating adverts in magazines.

Vocabulary: illustration, colour palette, artistic media and styles

Science: We will learn about living things and their habitats.

- The life cycle: all animals change during their life cycle: born, grow bigger and older and most go on to have babies of their own.
- A dog is a mammal that starts life growing inside the mother as an embryo, is born live and then grows outside of the mother.
- Frogs are amphibians and, like most amphibians, lays eggs to be hatched.
- Butterflies are insects who change by metamorphosis from a caterpillar.
- Seagulls are birds who hatch from an egg, grow and are fully mature at the age of 4.
- Living organisms have 7 life processes in common that show they are alive: movement, respiration, sensitivity, growth, reproduction, excretion, nutrition (MRS GREN)

Vocabulary: mammal, amphibian, reproduction, category



PSHE: Following the Cornwall Healthy Schools Units for PSHE covering Diverse Community and Respectful Relationships.

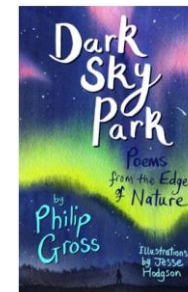
Lessons outcomes include:

- Describe the different communities that we belong to
- Explain what diversity means
- Describe my personal identify in simple terms
- Understand that we shouldn't discriminate against others
- Identifying healthy and respectful relationships

Vocabulary: diversity, community, personality, discriminate, character

English: We will be exploring and creating poetry inspired by "Dark Sky Park – Poems from the Edge of Nature" by Philip Gross. Our history work will link in to English by exploring some pieces of poetry by local poet, Alfred Leslie Rowse.

The collection of poetry by Philip Gross is rich in content, containing a range of poems that look at the world with a scientist's eyes, exploring fascinating life forms in extreme environments, from the deep sea bed to our own families.



The lesson sequence is designed so that the children's experience of poetry will support them using similar techniques, poetic devices and be able to create emotion and evoke empathy in their own writing.



- Pronouns are used in place of nouns e.g. he, she, they, it.
- A determiner is a word that introduces a noun.
- An apostrophe for singular possession shows something belongs to one person or thing.
- An apostrophe for plural possession shows that something belongs to more than one person or thing.
- Regular plurals end with the letter s.

Vocabulary: figurative language, genre, noun, verb, adjective, pronoun, determiner

Music: We will be continuing our weekly brass music lessons from Anna Minear.



- Read formal notation on a staff
- Metre is another term for rhythm
- Crescendo means getting louder
- Diminuendo means getting quieter

Vocabulary: instrument, music, volume, rhythm
